Council Corner: A Message On Water Conservation from Patricia Ledbetter, Councilmember, Place 2



During these consecutive 100 degree hot days water conservation is the topic of conversation. I could not help but think about my first understanding of the words conserve water. Growing up in rural north central Texas I had an education on water and its importance, when one year the Brazos River received an unusual quantity of water upstream, and it flooded downstream into the

Clear Fork. In rural Texas you had water wells and electric coops. Once the river water rose, you were cut off from electricity and therefore water. Drinking water was quickly retained in pots and pans, before the electric motor stopped on the water well. My concern at a young age then was not having water to drink, but how to wash my long blonde hair and take baths. I quickly learned there was a hierarchy of water use. One of which was not about my pretty little hair. I also learned that old adage *you never miss the water until the well runs dry*.

Extreme temperatures and lack of rain are resulting in widespread drought conditions in North Texas which have the potential to worsen as the summer goes on. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has encouraged all north Texas cities to begin to implement our drought contingency plan now.

The City of DeSoto encourages conservation through our water rates. In 2004, the DeSoto City Council adopted a three-tier rate structure for water customers intended to reward conservation efforts. Under this structure, water customers who consume less than 15,000 gallons per month pay the lowest water rate. Customers who use more than 15,001 gallons per month see a 50 cent increase in their rate per 1,000 gallons used. At 30,001 gallons of usage and above, the rate increases \$1 per 1,000 gallons over the base rate. This three-tier rate is intended to encourage the careful and considerate water user by rewarding modest usage with a lower rate. The structure also allows those who choose to use more water the ability to do so with the understanding

that they will pay more.

Residents are being asked to use water wisely by watering lawns during the cooler hours of the day between 5:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m., and only when needed. One inch of water every five to seven days is sufficient for most lawns. In addition, inspect all irrigations systems, make repairs as needed and limit the amount of water falling on paved surfaces. Please check the plumbing in your homes in order to identify leaks from areas such as: faucets, toilets and shower heads. Even a small drip can lead to an inflated water bill at the end of the month.

The addition of the Briarwood Elevated Storage tank a few years ago increased the City's water storage capacity to 18 million gallons. The City of DeSoto purchases water from Dallas Water Utilities at a rate of 14.5 million gallons per day. Our highest daily usage in recent weeks was 13.0 million gallons. Even with such high usage, we were able to fill storage tanks quickly. With adequate storage capacity, we can manage our water resources and costs by storing extra water on lower use days making it available for high use days. However, water conservation is a priority when we see so many 100 degree days in a row. We need to reduce usage during these periods to allow our storage tanks to refill.

Just as my parents had a hierarchy of water usage, the City of DeSoto has a water plan to protect the water we purchase from the City of Dallas so that we have what we need first, and then have extra for what is desirable for our lawns and lifestyle. Depending on the level of your needs, you pay at the level you use, if you use less you pay less, if you use more you pay more. DeSoto is not at the point of a mandatory water plan yet, and mandatory restrictions can be avoided by following these common sense water conservations measures. I encourage your voluntary usage restrictions during these hot days of summer and urge you to follow these suggestions, think about water conservation and have a reasonable usage level at your home.

City of DeSoto and JHP Architecture Receive NCTCOG CLIDE Award for the Town Center Mixed-Use Development

At their Annual General Assembly Meeting on Friday, June 17th, the North Central Texas Council of Governments named the City of DeSoto and JHP Architecture recipients of a Celebrating Leadership in Development Excellence (CLIDE) Award for the mixed use development at DeSoto Town Center. The CLIDE Award Recognition Program, established in 2003, honors local projects and initiatives that are helping to ensure the region's prosperity into the future. These projects exemplify the mission of the Center of Development Excellence to promote quality growth in North Central Texas that enhances the built environment, reduces vehicle miles of travel, uses water and energy resources effectively and efficiently, and helps advance environmental stewardship in order to ensure continued economic vitality and provide the highest attainable quality for all residents.

The DeSoto Town Center was one of sixteen projects in North Central Texas recognized in the 2011 CLIDE Award Recognition Program. This award is given to projects that exemplify one or more of the "Principles of Development Excellence" established by the Center of Development Excellence in the categories of new development, redevelopment, special development, raising public awareness and public planning and policy. DeSoto Town Center was recognized by the CLIDE Award as a Redevelopment project because of it's re-use of existing structures.

Development Services is currently working on Phase II of the Water/Wastewater Repair and Replacement (R&R) Project for 2012. This project includes the reconstruction of waterlines, sewer lines, streets and alleys in the Brookhollow Estates subdivision. Phase I is currently under construction. Phase II will include Valleyglen Drive (Hampton to Rock Creek), Highridge Drive (Hampton to Terrace), Bailey Drive (Hampton to Rock Creek) and Rock Creek Drive (Valleyglen to Bailey).
